

- 5. How was Jacob's second deception (Genesis 27) more devious that the first (Gen 25:29-34)? How many ways did Jacob deceive his father?
 - What did the loss of this blessing mean? How did Esau feel? 27:41
- 6. What assurance did the Lord give Jacob in a dream? 28:10-15
 - What did the ladder represent? John 1:51 (How was Nathaniel not like Jacob? 1:47)
- 7. What did Jacob recognize about the dream? 28:16,17
 - How did Jacob's statement in 28:20-22 show a lack of faith?

"It appears to me that God is offering Jacob the opportunity of a relationship with himself. This understanding is rarely acknowledged or considered simply because most people assume that the patriarchs were all born in a relationship with God. But just because God superintends the birth of a person and has plans for him certainly doesn't mean that he or she doesn't need to come to know God personally. Every person (patriarch or not) must exercise faith in God's promise of redemption (Messiah) to be justified (Rom 3—4)...The plotline of the story now follows what God will have to do to Jacob for him to see how much he needs God!"


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8. How did the Lord use Laban to discipline Jacob? Gen 29:15-30

"God's strategy is so pointed and perfect—he's bringing into Jacob's life someone who can do to him what he has always done to others. God is giving him a taste of his own medicine, not to punish him, but to begin to open his eyes to the truth of his own limitations. Jacob simply cannot negotiate life on his own. As clever as he is, there is always someone even more clever. His only hope is to name and turn from his self-reliance and turn to God's ways, but Jacob doesn't yet get that."

[&]quot;Jacob, the deceitful fighter, was crippled by a supernatural blow. He had struggled all his life with God to obtain His blessings and now God crippled his human strength. The touch of God dislocated his thigh, the strongest part of the wrestler. Jacob had to learn that his carnal weapons were useless; he could not enter the promised land on his own strength. He had to admit and reveal his character (heel-catcher, or deceiver) before he could obtain his blessing....Jacob didn't overcome by being stubborn; he overcame when he quit fighting, confessed his sin and asked in faith.
