Ephesians 4:1-16

Chapter 4 marks a turning point in the letter to the Ephesians, where Paul begins to exhort his readers to live or "walk in a manner worthy" of the calling they have received.

Paul first focuses on the need for believers to walk in love and unity. He then turns to the various gifts and roles given by God in order to equip and build up the body, so that all can be brought to maturity and not be swayed by false doctrine.

As you read these verses, think about the attitudes and commitment that all believers need to have in order for the body of Christ to stand strong.

<u>Day 1</u>

Ephesians 4:2-3 NAS

Therefore I, the prisoner of the Lord, implore you to walk in a manner worthy of the calling with which you have been called,

2 with all humility and gentleness, with patience, showing tolerance for one another in love,

3 being diligent to preserve the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace.

IT'S GREEK TO ME "worthy" - NT:516 axios, appropriately:

"calling" – Strong's #2821 klesis, an invitation

"We are now asked to walk in our daily life in such a way that it may be compared with the glorious heavenly calling revealed in the first three chapters of this epistle."

Walk worthy of the calling with which you were called: When we really understand how much God did for us, we will naturally want to serve and obey Him out of gratitude. Understanding *who we are* is the foundation of this worthy walk...We don't walk worthy *so that* God will love us, but *because* He does love us. It is motivated out of gratitude, not out of a desire to earn merit."

 - Col. 1:10 so that you will walk in a manner worthy of the Lord, to please Him in all respects, bearing fruit in every good work and increasing in the knowledge of God; NAS
 - 1 Thessalonians 2:12 so that you would walk in a manner worthy of the God who calls you into His own kingdom and glory. NAS

Patience/longsuffering NT:3115 makrothumia; longanimity, i.e. forbearance or fortitude

- makros, "long," thumos, "temper" - Vine's Expository Dictionary of Biblical Words

Showing tolerance/bearing with Strong's NT:430 *anechomai*; to hold oneself up against, i.e. (figuratively) put up with: KJV - bear with, endure, forbear, suffer.

- "forbearance, long-suffering, self-restraint before proceeding to actions. The quality of a person who is able to avenge himself yet refrains from doing so. " The Complete Word Study Dictionary (939)
- "We need this so that the inevitable wrongs that occur between people in God's family will not work against God's purpose of bringing all things together in Jesus illustrated through His current work in the church. Chrysostom defined longsuffering as the spirit that has the power to take revenge, but never does. It is characteristic of a forgiving, generous heart."

Day 2

Ephesians 4:3-6 NAS

- 3 being diligent to preserve the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace.
- 4 There is one body and one Spirit, just as also you were called in one hope of your calling;
- 5 one Lord, one faith, one baptism,
- 6 one God and Father of all who is over all and through all and in all.

Unity of the body

One Spirit

 - Ephesians 1:17 I keep asking that the God of our Lord Jesus Christ, the glorious Father, may give you the Spirit of wisdom and revelation, so that you may know him better. NIV

One Hope

 - 1 Thessalonians 5:8 But since we belong to the day, let us be self-controlled, putting on faith and love as a breastplate, and the hope of salvation as a helmet NIV
 - 1 Timothy 4:10(and for this we labor and strive), that we have put our hope in the living God, who is the Savior of all men, and especially of those who believe NIV
 - Hebrews 6:19 This hope we have as an anchor of the soul, a hope both sure and steadfast and one which enters within the veil, NASU
 - Titus 3:7 so that being justified by His grace we would be made heirs according to the hope of eternal life. NASU
 - 1 Peter 1:3 Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who according to His great mercy has caused us to be born again to a living hope through the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead, NASU
 - 1 John 3:2-3 Beloved, now we are children of God, and it has not appeared as yet what we will be. We know that when He appears, we will be like Him, because we will see Him just as He is. 3 And everyone who has this hope fixed on Him purifies himself, just as He is pure. NASU
 - 1 Timothy 1:1 Paul, an apostle of Christ Jesus according to the commandment of God our Savior, and of Christ Jesus, who is our hope, NASU

IT'S GREEK TO ME: **Hope** Strong's NT:1680 *elpis*;...expectation (abstractly or concretely) or confidence:

- "favorable and confident expectation" - Vine's Expository Dictionary of Biblical Words

"Hope in Scripture is not the world's definition of 'I **hope** so', with a few rare exceptions (e.g., <u>Acts 27:20.</u>)
Hope is defined as a desire for some future good with the expectation of obtaining it. Hope is confident expectancy. Hope is the looking forward to something with some reason for confidence respecting fulfillment. Earlier Paul had prayed for enlightenment, that the saints would **know** (beyond a shadow of a doubt...) that the eyes of your heart may be enlightened, so that you will know what is the hope of His calling, what are the riches of the glory of His inheritance in the saints...

Hope as the world typically defines it is a desire for some future occurrence of which one is not assured of attaining. The ancient world did not generally regard **hope** as a virtue, but merely as a temporary illusion. Historians tell us that a great cloud of **hopelessness** covered the ancient world. Philosophies were empty... Religions derived [from] man's warped imagination were powerless to help men face either life or death. People longed to pierce the veil and get some message of hope from the other side, a message ultimately found only in the Cross of Christ."

FYI: "The acknowledgment of this one Lord was a matter of the most vital consequence to many Christians in the early centuries of our era. Because they had but one Lord, they refused to give the title 'Lord' to others who claimed it, notably to the Roman Emperor, when it was claimed in a sense that implied divinity."

"Ultimately it was the early Christians' allegiance to Christ as supreme Lord that really became the impetus of persecution. The emperors wanted to be acknowledged and worshiped as 'Lord' in an effort to hold together the disintegrating immoral, chaotic Roman society through a central figure of authority designated as 'god.' But Christianity's view of the exclusivity of Jesus Christ would not allow such an acknowledgement. Thus, Christians were seen as a threat to the state...

Persecution by the world against Christians comes in many forms. But its central core is the rejection of God and the resulting attack on those who follow Christ and claim He is the supreme Lord and the only way to salvation."

Day 3

Ephesians 4:7-13 NAS

7 But to each one of us grace was given according to the measure of Christ's gift.

8 Therefore it says,

"WHEN HE ASCENDED ON HIGH,

HE LED CAPTIVE A HOST OF CAPTIVES.

AND HE GAVE GIFTS TO MEN."

9(Now this expression, "He ascended," what does it mean except that He also had descended into the lower parts of the earth?

- 10 He who descended is Himself also He who ascended far above all the heavens, so that He might fill all things.)
- 11 And He gave some as apostles, and some as prophets, and some as evangelists, and some as pastors and teachers,
- 12 for the equipping of the saints for the work of service, to the building up of the body of Christ;
- 13 until we all attain to the unity of the faith, and of the knowledge of the Son of God, to a mature man, to the measure of the stature which belongs to the fullness of Christ.

FYI: "John MacArthur comments on Paul's use of <u>Psalm 68</u> noting that this psalm...is a victory hymn composed by David to celebrate God's conquest of the Jebusite city and the triumphant ascent of God (represented by the Ark of the Covenant) up Mount Zion (cf. <u>2 Sa. 6-7</u>; 1Chr 13). After a king won such a victory he would bring home the spoils and enemy prisoners to parade before his people. An Israelite king would take his retinue through the holy city of Jerusalem and up Mount Zion.

Another feature of the victory parade, however, would be the display of the king's own soldiers who had been freed after being held prisoner by the enemy. These were often referred to as **recaptured captives**—prisoners who had been taken prisoner again, so to speak, by their own king and given freedom. (<u>MacArthur, J: Ephesians. "Equipping also has the idea of 'to put right.' This ancient Greek word was used to describe setting broken bones or mending nets. These ministries work together to produce strong, mended, fit Christians." - David Guzik

"The gifts enumerated in verse 11 do not monopolize the Church's ministry; their function rather is to help and direct the Church that all the members may perform their several ministries for the good of the whole. 'In the theocracy of grace there is in fact no laity.' (E.K. Simpson)"

IT'S GREEK TO ME *Mature* (4:13) Strong's NT:5046 *teleios*, complete (in various applications of labor, growth, mental and moral character, etc.)

"The gifted offices and equipped saints bring the saints to maturity, according to the **measure** of Jesus Himself. As years pass by, we should not only grow *old* in Jesus, but *more mature* in Him as well.

Again, by clearly stating that this is a **unity of the** *faith*, Paul did not command a structural or organizational unity, but a spiritual unity around a common faith."

Day 4

Ephesians 4:14-16 NAS

- 14 As a result, we are no longer to be children, tossed here and there by waves and carried about by every wind of doctrine, by the trickery of men, by craftiness in deceitful scheming;
- 15 but speaking the truth in love, we are to grow up in all aspects into Him who is the head, even Christ, 16 from whom the whole body, being fitted and held together by what every joint supplies, according to the proper working of each individual part, causes the growth of the body for the building up of itself in love.

IT'S GREEK TO ME: **tossed here and there** "kludonizomai NT:2831 signifies 'to be tossed by billows' (kludon, 'a billow'); metaphorically, in Eph 4:14, of an unsettled condition of mind influenced and agitated by one false teaching and another, and characterized by that immaturity which lacks the firm conviction begotten by the truth."

"The ancient Greek word for **tossed to and fro** is from the same words used to describe the stormy Sea of Galilee in <u>Luke 8:24</u> (*raging of the water*). We can wrongly value *movement* over *growth*; mere movement is being tossed to and fro, but God wants us to **grow up in all things**."

trickery/cunning/sleight – Strong's "NT:2940 *kubeia*; from *kubos* (a 'cube', i.e. die for playing); gambling, i.e. (figuratively) artifice or fraud: KJV - sleight."

"By the trickery of men: 'The words . . . refer to the arts used by gamesters, who employ false *dice* that will always throw up one kind of number, which is that by which those who play with them cannot win.' (Clarke) Running after spiritual fads always leaves one a loser." - David Guzik

Craftiness Strong's NT:3834 panourgia; adroitness, i.e. (in a bad sense) trickery or sophistry

deceitful scheming – Strong's #4106 "A wandering out of the right way. In the NT, used only figuratively meaning error...In an active sense, deceit, fraud, seduction to error and sin (Matt. 27:64; Eph. 4:14; 2 Peter 3:17; 1 John 4:6...)"

IT'S GREEK TO ME: **speaking the truth** Strong's #226 NT:226 aletheuo; to be true (in doctrine and profession)

"The verb... in this context probably means not only speaking truth but living and acting it as well - 'dealing truly,' as RV puts it. Such true dealing is the very antithesis of the roguery described by the apostle in the preceding verse."

"This verb means more than talking about the truth. It is rather living and acting the truth that the Apostle has in mind. This is the antidote to the spiritual duplicity of the previous verse. There should be works as well as words, but both must be 'in love'. It is possible to put the truth over in a hard way, to be very correct in doctrine, but to show a complete lack of love in presenting it. This nullifies its power and spoils its witness." - Stuart Allen (91)
