 - What does Psalm <u>130</u>:5-6 add to the idea of waiting? (See also Micah 7:7; Habakkuk 2:1)

For more verses about praying *in the morning* see: Ps 88:13; 119:147-148; Mark 1:35

IT'S HEBREW TO ME: "wait in expection (NIV); "will look up (NKJV); "eagerly watch" (NASB); "will keep watch" (ASV); Strongs OT:6822 tsaphah, to lean forward, i.e. to peer into the distance; by implication, to observe, await"

FYI: "Your holy temple": "a poetic reference to intimate fellowship with the Lord." - Charles Swindoll (21)

"For Christian people, no place one earth is in itself more holy than any other. Jesus has 'tabernacled' among us (John 1:14, literal translation) and fulfilled the deepest meaning of the temple of OT days. Since the Holy Spirit has come and made our lives and the fellowship of God's people his temple (see 1 Cor. 6:19-20; 2 Cor. 6:16) we can no longer think of a building in the way that OT people thought of the temple. A building can be set aside as a place of worship and prayer, but we worship 'in spirit and in truth' (John 4:19-24) and our lives are to be God's living temple (Eph. 2:19-22)."

David's desire

6. What requests did David make first? 5:8 (Consider: Why do you think he didn't pray first for immediate relief or removal of the problem?)

FYI: "Discouragement can easily escalate into resentment, bitterness, hatred, and finally retaliation. He feared becoming like his oppressors. So, David reflected on the Lord's character and asked Him to the ability to do things His way. [v. 8]"

David's enemies

7. What characterized David's enemies? 5:9 (Compare John 8:44) (How destructive do you see these attitudes and behaviors having on another person and on society?)

FYI: "With such people all the resources of speech - mouth, throat and tongue - combine to achieve (and to conceal) the designs of the hearts. The methods are those of the serpent in Eden." - Derek Kidner (76)

8. What did David ask God to do to his enemies and why? 5:10 (See 2 Samuel 15:31)

FYI: "Sometimes we think of God's judgment as opposed to His love. Yet it is because of His love for all people that He cannot allow those who oppose His ways and oppress others to go on as they like forever...5:10 should teach us to be concerned for the victory of righteousness, and we certainly should pray that people may not continue to rebel against God and despise His people."

"When dealing with those who oppose righteousness, it's helpful to remember that they are fighting against the Lord, not you. Consequently, you can be sure He will not allow evil deeds to continue forever. He will limit sin and hold the sinners accountable. If left alone in their own counsel, they will fall by themselves!

Paul the apostle says it straight in Romans 12:17-19.

Never pay back evil for evil to anyone. Respect what is right in the sight of all men. If possible, so far as it depends on you, be at peace with all men. Never take your own revenge, beloved, but leave room for the wrath of God, for it is written, "VENGEANCE IS MINE, I WILL REPAY," says the Lord.

The daily grind of discouragement is lessened when we trust that the Lord will fight our battles for us."

God's protection

9. What attitudes does trust in the Lord produce and why? 5:11

IT'S HEBREW TO ME: take refuge/put their trust "OT:2620 chacah; to flee for protection; figuratively, to confide in"

Spread your protection/defend/shelter "OT:5526 cakak or sakak; to entwine as a screen; by implication, to fence in, cover over, (figuratively) protect"

Surround/compass "OT:5849 ` atar, to encircle (for attack or protection); especially to crown"

Applying the Word: "In the midst of discouragement, it's difficult to count your blessings." Swindoll (20) What helps direct your heart and hope toward God during a difficult time? What effect does that have on your prayers?

Day 3 Read Psalm 37

This Psalm was originally written as an easily remembered acrostic using the Hebrew alphabet, creating a hymn to express David's deep faith and encourage his people. It was written after a long life of dealing with personal injustices and failings, betrayals and tragedies, and summarizes what he learned about trusting God in spite of his difficult circumstances.

"The Hebrew for *commit* is literally 'roll', as though getting rid of a burden."

These are the things that bring lasting peace and satisfaction - not the things we think we want or strive to achieve apart from God." - Charles Stanley (650)

- 15. Which of the commands in vv.1-8 do you struggle with, especially when the ungodly seem to flourish?
- 16. What view of time will help us not to fret? 37:2,9-11 (See also 1 John 2:17)

FYI: "A little while: Shortness of time is here a figure for the certainty of event (Job 20:5-11; Haggai 2:6)."

FYI: "The picture of verses 13-15 is of a defeat which the Lord sees coming...The history of the church, from Stephen and Saul to the present day, is full of such reversals."

IT'S HEBREW TO ME: **Wait** "OT:6960 *qavah*; to bind together (perhaps by twisting), i.e. collect; (figuratively) to expect" - Strong's Concordance

"The picture of the term *quvah* is used to describe the 'binding together' of strings for a chord...It carries the idea of anticipation toward useful results...It does not imply useless boredom, waiting for something to happen. The essence of the term is to be alert, watching the events and activities of the Lord to react to His timing and His direction.

Indeed, the word it translated 'look' as often as any other term."

24. What final picture is given of the life of the wicked? 37:35,36 (Cf. Psalm 73:3-12; 17-19; Job 20:4-9)

25. With what final assurances does the Psalm end? 37:37-40 (See also Isaiah 46:4)

This Psalm was probably written near the end of David's life. How do all the struggles he
had endured and the enemies he had faced (See the chart: Chronology of David's Life),
impact the words of this psalm?

FYI: "Certainly one of the more encouraging special blessings given in the psalmic literature is the promise that no matter how much the wicked seem to be succeeding over the efforts of the righteous, they will not win!...The continual message of these verses is that God will not forsake His beloved saints. They may *seem* to be forgotten for a season, but they are never out of the eye of Him who loves them (See...Psalm 33:19-8-18, 34:15;...1 Peter 3:12 for parallel references.) God *is* protecting His beloved. God *does* have a plan in His sovereign and eternal mind. God *will* work all things 'together for good, to them that love God, to them who are the called according to His purpose' (Rom. 8:28)"

"The psalm ends with calm objectivity, the answer to the fretful impatience encountered at the start. Note the *from* him (39) and the *in* him (40): his initiative in sending and our response in taking shelter; the help that He gives, and the refuge that He is."
