* "The natural expectation of the reader at this point might be the immediate invasion and settlement of the land based upon a well-established confidence in God's commitment to, and fulfillment of His promises. This expectation would fail, however, to take into account the contingency in God's plan which is dependent upon the people's response to His plan. Because of their unbelief, the generation of the Exodus failed to enjoy the promises which God offered them. The message of Numbers is: Israel's walk in covenant relationship is initiated and ordered by God, but is delayed and disrupted by Israel's disobedience."
